The *Promenade Junior Choir* was set up in June 2008 by Christopher Goldsack to provide a high quality singing opportunity for children aged 8 - 14. It aims to give young singers an introduction to the riches of choral music. Members are expected to work hard, but the atmosphere is warm and supportive. Christopher is a singer and singing teacher from Hersham, and his emphasis is on good singing technique and ensemble work. The choir has already shown its potential in three previous concerts. This is its fourth. Its programmes are getting progressively more challenging, whilst the children are gaining in vocal experience and confidence. New members are welcome to join.

In January 2009 Christopher set up a new choir for older singers, with the support of a grant from the R. C. Sherriff Trust. This concert is the inaugural performance for the *Promenade Youth Choir*. It is a mixed voice choir catering for singers aged 12 - 18. The repertoire for today's concert is very varied and chosen to demonstrate the range of music the choir will be performing.

The choirs have just been awarded a grant by the Charity of Robert Phillips to promote performance opportunities.
